ALCD Invitation: Decision Checklist

In addition to the general minimum requirements students must meet to be admitted into the Academic, Social and Career Enrichment program (ASCE), students who are considered for the ALCD program are expected to have successfully completed the ASCE program. Students interested in the ALCD program must meet all the following criteria:

Meets Expectations	Does NOT Meet Expectations	Mandatory Criteria – Students must meet ALL the following criteria to be considered for admission into the program.		
		Attendance at 70% of program meetings during the student's enrollment in the ASCE program. Such meetings shall include, but are not limited to, study hall, social hours, and internship participation.		
		Demonstrate, through the evaluation of Academy staff and the submission of evaluation and documentation from qualified mental health care professionals, that they do not suffer from a mental health or behavioral condition that would impact their ability to function or participate fully in the ALCD Program.		
		Successful academic performance in ASCE, which may be demonstrated by a C average in their courses.		
		Students must not be on probation.		
		Ability to function independently for sustained periods of time, as demonstrated by the student's performance measures and advisor observations.		
		No reports of disruptive behaviors. For purposes of this criterion, such reports include, but are not limited to, reports or complaints from case managers, Residence Life, Student Conduct, the Office Institutional Equity, or Public Safety.

		Demonstrates effective communication skills, which shall be evaluated using successful completion of the professional communication courses with a grade of B or better. Additional measures may include a formalized assessment in reading and positive evaluations by internship supervisors and academic advisors.	
		The student must have marketable skills that will allow them to work in a professional environment Measures in this area may include successful completion of the customer service certificates and positive evaluations by internship supervisors and academic advisors.	
		Reduced reliance on peer and social mentors, as demonstrated through evaluations of academic advisors, peer mentors, and program assessments.	
		The student must demonstrate an interest in continuing his or her education as evidenced by previous course assignments and discussions with their academic advisors.	
		The student must demonstrate self-awareness and the ability to self-advocate. Measures in this area may include yearly participation in self-advocacy day, successful completion of groups, and a positive evaluation by academic advisors.	

Academy Coursework

- **ALCD 1 Academic Enrichment**: Access to a variety of college course types that are attended by students without disabilities, professional education certification courses as well as Academy non-inclusive courses that promote academic success. Students will:
 - ALCD 1.1 Enroll in one non-credited (audited) course per semester attended by students without disabilities. Students may choose courses that align with career goals and personal interests offered through Kennesaw State University's course catalog of classes. Students must meet prerequisites for all audited courses. (Course offerings are available in this document).
 - ALCD 1.2 Follow the ALCD Certificate Pathway completing the following non-inclusive academy taught support classes: Advanced Professional Communications I IV, Leadership Seminars I IV, and Career Preparation and Internship V VIII.
 - ALCD 1.3 Complete a certificate program through Professional Education in Kennesaw State University's College of Continuing Education in two areas.
 - ALCD 1.4 Access courses that are not limited to a pre-determined list and aligned with post-secondary career goals.
 - ALCD 1.5 Complete assessments to monitor reading comprehension and growth.
 - ALCD 1.6 Participate in courses that relate to personal, academic, and career goals as established through person-centered planning.

- ALCD 1.7 Maintain a 70% in all audited and inclusive work as calculated by the Academy Academic Unit.
- ALCD 1.8 Maintain a 70% participation rate in all program activities each semester. (See attached chart).
- ALCD 1.9 Receive access to peer mentors, academic advisors, and campus student disability services.
- ALCD 1.10 Attend study sessions with a prescribed number of hours (self and group format) to aid in completion of program requirements.
- **ALCD 2 Career Development:** facilitation of vocational progression by providing students with support and experiences necessary to acquire and sustain competitive employment. Students will:
 - ALCD 2.1 Use a person-centered plan to identify career goals.
 - ALCD 2.2 Complete career interest inventory to identify areas of strength and possible programs of study.
 - ALCD 2.3 Participate in internships and career-based training (based on student interest) in settings with people without disabilities.
 - ALCD 2.4 Meet with Program Advisors to establish a work plan related to personal choice and career goals.
 - ALCD 2.5 Complete 15 internship hours per semester.
 - ALCD 2.6 Build a career portfolio including a resume, cover letter, and professional recommendations.
 - ALCD 2.7 Take courses that align with career goals.
- **ALCD 3 Social Development**: Participation in social enrichment opportunities, personal growth and social skills development. Students will:
 - $ALCD\ 3.1-Engage$ in social enrichment opportunities provided both on campus and through the Academy program.
 - ALCD 3.2 Join one on-campus club or organization.
 - ALCD 3.3 Participate in social development training each week as part of hours earned towards certificate completion.
 - ALCD 3.4 Participate in peer group meetings two hours per month.
 - ALCD 3.5 Have access to residence life facilities and activities, including, when desired, on-campus housing options.

- ALCD 3.6 Completion of the self-reliance assessments at the beginning of year 1 and year 2 to measure person-centered growth and independence.
- ALCD 3.7 Monitor progress towards personal goals.
- ALCD 3.8 Adhere to all policies and procedures in the Kennesaw State University's student handbook/code of conduct for students and the Academy for Inclusive Learning and Social Growth's Program Handbook.
- **ALCD 4 Program Specific**: To facilitate alignment with college systems and practices for students with intellectual disabilities, the comprehensive postsecondary education program will:
 - ALCD 4.1 Facilitate the development and promotion of self-determination skills.
 - ALCD 4.2 Ensure student involvement in person-centered planning and creating personal goals that reflect student interest.
 - ALCD 4.3 Provide access to academic advising and campus resources.

ALCD Academy Support Coursework to Complete Certificate Pathway

AIAE 0301 Advanced Professional Communications I

This course is designed to understand theories and practice of speech and written communication as applied to business and professional situations. Students will learn to demonstrate an understanding of professional language, written principles, and multimodal communication, including verbal, written, and digital/visual modes. Grading Scheme: A-F

AIAE 0302 Advanced Professional Communications II

This course will expand on the skills presented in Advanced Professional Communications I and is designed to improve communication skills with peers, family, teachers, and large groups of people. Students will explore the role of rapidly expanding technologies in verbal and nonverbal messages, listening skills and critical thinking. Grading Scheme: A-F

AIAE 0303 Leadership Seminar I

This course provides a framework for developing leadership skills as they relate to career and academic success. Seminars are designed to promote the leveraging of leadership skills as a basis for career success, as well as individual and group impact within the global community. This course will focus on the development of leadership skills through lectures, group work, and experiential learning opportunities. Grading Scheme: A-F

AIAE 0304 Leadership Seminar II

This course will build on skills developed in Leadership Seminar I and identify abilities that help develop leaders in the workplace. Students will identify and evaluate their communication style, leadership style, complete peer reviews, and practice constructive feedback. Students will participate dedicated leadership hours and training in the larger campus community. Grading Scheme: A-F

AIAE 0305 Career Preparation and Internship V

This course will focus on the development of job skills including interviewing techniques, resume preparation, career exploration, and career preparation. Students will investigate the job search process and recognize the qualities, skills, and abilities that employers are seeking in job candidates. Internship hours are required. Grading Scheme: Pass/Fail

AIAE 0306 Career Preparation and Internship VI

This course will build on skills leaned in Career Preparation and Internship V and identify key career development theories and learn how to integrate self-knowledge into occupational/life decisions, set goals, and devise strategies to attain these goals. Internship hours are required. Grading Scheme: Pass/Fail.

AIAE 0401Advanced Professional Communications III

This course will explore communication in the global economy that requires individuals to be creative and have a strong background in computer and technology applications, a strong and solid academic foundation, and a proficiency in professional oral and written communication. Location: Kennesaw Campus

AIAE 0402 Advanced Professional Communications IV

This course will expand on the skills learned in Advanced Professional Communications III and enable students to expand their ability to write, read, edit, speak, listen, and conduct Internet research in professional settings. Grading Scheme: A-F

AIAE 0403 Leadership Seminar III

This course will focus on the development of leadership skills through lecture, group work, and experiential learning opportunities and is designed to prepare students in their final year of the ALCD program to present their skills and value to potential coworkers, employers, and other stakeholders. Grading Scheme: A-F

AIAE 0404 Leadership Seminar IV

This course builds on the skills learned in Leadership Seminar III and provides students a framework for developing leadership skills as they relate to career success. Students will create an ePortfolio designed to help them promote themselves through a comparison of their skills and abilities and the artifacts that demonstrate their abilities. Grading Scheme: A-F

AIAE 0405 Career Preparation and Internship VII

This course is designed to prepare students in the ALCD program for the transition to the workforce. Students will investigate how their skills, interests, values and personality influence career decisions. Students will begin to organize and prepare professional documents that includes resumes, cover letters, letters of recommendation, and other essential items needed for a customized employment portfolio. Internship hours are required. Grading Scheme: Pass/Fail

AIAE 0406 Career Preparation and Internship VIII

Students will work with transition and career specialists to focus on job opportunities and establishing strategic career and professional goals. Students will complete professional documents that include a resume, cover letters, letters of recommendation, and other essential items needed for a customized employment portfolio. Internship hours are required. Grading Scheme Pass/Fail
